Last year while killing some time during the washed-out concourse day at the meet in Batavia, NY, several of us registered for the 2007 meet in Fairfax and made reservations at the meet hotel. It sure seemed like a long way off, but now the date was here.

Just before the meet, Dan and Diane Pudelek hosted our traditional drivers meeting at their home. While we enjoyed a nice meal and beverages provided by our hosts, we went over maps and the tour route, a travel checklist, and plans to visit an "old friend" along the way. Everyone went home with a prize from our trivia contest. There was a little Fairfax history, a little V-8 club trivia, and a lot of laughs.

Meeting the morning of Wednesday, May 30, at the Lincoln Oasis were Joe & Nell Kozmic in their '37 Coupe, Joey Novak in his '40 Pickup, Dan & Diane Pudelek in their '53 Victoria, and Ken & Carolyn Bounds in our '50 Convertible. corde, to the SR-71 Blackbird reconnaissance plane, to the space shuttle Enterprise. If you ever have the chance to be in the DC area, don't miss the opportunity to spend some time at this museum.

Sunday night we had an enjoyable social hour followed by the awards dinner. We were joined at our table by John McNally with his wife and daughter. John's immaculate '32 3-Window Coupe just happens to be featured in



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a two-part article in the last two issues of the V-8 Times. There were plenty of speeches and presentations. The long-distance trophy was awarded to *someone* in the NIRG group. There was some concern that we may have doctored our mileage a bit, but I don't think they were ready to offer odometer repair – we were pretty close. TECH CORNER



When we attended the Eastern National Meet in Fairfax, the Northern Virginia Regional Group included a couple of nice "tech-tip" items in the attendees' packages. One was the "Getting Ready to Tour" checklist by our own Tom O'Donnell that we issued with the March *Road Chatter*. Another was a very nice booklet of tech tips collected from past issues of the NVRG *Valve Clatter*. This month we are including one of those tips, courtesy of our friends at the NVRG, written by editor Cliff Green.

The Condenser

One of the culprits of the ignition system is the condenser. This little device can stop the car from running at any time when it becomes shorted or open. It can cause the points to pit and consequently affect the dwell.

The purpose of the condenser is to absorb the spark that would occur when the points just start to open and prevent the points from burning and pitting. It provides current storage until the points are fully opened then is discharged back through the primary. The capacity value is measured in microfarads and varies with different ignition systems. For the early flathead V8, the book states that the prewar engine condenser should measure .330-.360 microfarads and the post war .290-.320. Any value lesser or greater will cause the points to burn and pit prematurely which would affect the dwell. Now, how do we measure this without the fancy Ford Laboratory Testing Machine, which has a feature to conduct such a test? There is an inexpensive digital meter available on-line or from Grainger that will do this. The A/C repairman who replaced my fan motor had one to check the starting capacitor. I borrowed it to check all the condensers that I had stockpiled and wrote the value on each one. Of the ten that I had, only three registered the proper value as specified in the service manual! Of course, the meter will also show if the condenser is shorted or open by not registering. Now, this is only part of the test. We need to simulate the heat of the engine by placing the condenser in the oven (not microwave) and heat it up to 150 degrees and run the test again!

The condition of a 50 plus year old condenser should always be suspect even if it is NOS out of the box. How do we check it in the field? With the use of a battery operated ohmmeter with a needle (not digital). Set the meter to the lowest setting. Ground the negative lead or terminal to the case in order to discharge it. Then with the ground wire of the meter held to the can, touch the other lead to the terminal. The needle should jump up and recede. All this does is determine that the condenser is not shorted or open. We have no idea of its capacitance value.

So, the culprit can be tested to eliminate one of the most frequent causes of ignition failure. Condensers do have a life, which can not be determined, so it is advisable to change it every time the points are changed and keep a spare in the toolbox. Of course, those running with the electronic system do not have to worry about this.

How long do you store your vegetables?

With the summer season in full swing and the fabulous vegetables at the grocery store and farmers markets, I find myself buying more and more fresh vegetables. Unfortunately, that is also translating to me throwing out more vegetables that have gone bad before I can use them. According to the University of Kentucky - College of Agriculture, a recent online survey indicates that Americans discard \$14.00 worth of food every week because of improper storage. Here are some recommendation on how long you can safely store your vegetables.
