Our Anniversary Car By Earl Heintz



On a Sunday in August of 1977, Gene and I had planned on going to a street rod swap meet at the Woodstock Fairgrounds. Unfortunately in the morning when we woke up it was pouring rain so we decided to hold off and see if it would let up. At noon it finally stopped raining and the sun came out so we headed out to Woodstock.

As we entered the fairgrounds I noticed a nice blue 1951 Mercury Coupe with a "For Sale" sign on it. The owner, Floyd Griebel Jr., happened to be there and he told us he had just arrived because he didn't want to drive the car in the rain. As I looked it over I could see there were no dents, scratches, or rust on the vehicle. I thanked him and left to walk through the swap meet. We found nothing

worthwhile to buy, but kept thinking about the '51 Merc we saw earlier; I couldn't get it out of my mind.

On the way out we noticed it was still there for sale so we stopped and asked if it would be possible to test drive the car. Floyd said sure, that he was just ready to leave shortly anyway and would meet us at a designated place. As we started walking to our car I heard Floyd start the engine and then we heard nothing. I said to Gene "Don't turn around and look for I don't believe it started." The words were no sooner out of my mouth when the car rolled past us. We were shocked that it was so quiet and the car ran so smooth.

We met Floyd down the road a piece and took it for the test drive. Needless to say we were very excited because the car handled so well and was in such good condition inside and out. When we got back Floyd said he was asking \$3,500 firm, which we thought was a fair price, so we ended up purchasing it that same day and have really enjoyed driving it and still do to this day. We were told that the original owner was a lady from St. Louis, Missouri, and she had sold it to Floyd. We bought it from him, so we are the 3rd owners of the car.

In the summer of 1982 our Northern Illinois Regional Group V-8 Club toured to the Quad Cities in Iowa to meet with their V-8 group for the weekend. On Saturday, the Iowa V-8 Club set up a very nice tour, but with so many cars, they divided us up into two groups of 15 cars. Gene drove the '51 Mercury and

took Gladys Duzell, Lois Wall, and Harriet Lawrence with her and I went with Lloyd Duzell in his 1940 Ford Pickup. The tour was wonderful, a beautiful day and everyone was having a great time. After our last stop at the John Deere factory we started back to meet up with the other group. As we approached the town of East Moline there was a line of antique cars stopped ahead of us and a police car with red



lights flashing. Marty Duling was running up the road waving his arms at Lloyd and I and he told me that Gene and the other girls were in an accident. She was the 11th car in her group and was going through an intersection with the traffic light green for her when a gentleman driving a 1970 Buick Electra 4-door sedan ran the red light and at the last second turned and hit our Merc broadside. Luckily no one was injured in either car and we were able to drive it all the way back home.

The next day I called J. C. Taylor Insurance and informed them of the accident. When the adjuster came to look at the car I told

him that this Merc was not going to any body shop and lo and behold he agreed with me and said that would be fine! I talked to Lloyd Duzell and he agreed to do the repairs. Lloyd suggested we try to find a new right front fender since it had been so mangled. He suggested Garton's Auto Parts in New Jersey.



I called and found an NOS fender for \$250! It arrived on a semi truck packaged in a crate made of 2x6's. It was so heavy that the driver and I could hardly lift it off the truck. The fender had never been on a car and even had a Ford sticker and the part number on the underside. As you can see from the pictures, Lloyd's repairs turned out great. Since then we have gone on many tours and car shows with nice trophies to show for it.

In 1998 I purchased two new water pumps for the car and asked Lloyd if he would install them for me. When he removed the old pumps you could spoon the sludge out of the engine, it was so bad;

so Lloyd suggested we take the engine out. I agreed and we took it to Mike at Performance Engineering

in Wauconda, IL, to have it rebuilt. While the engine was out of the car, Lloyd detailed the engine compartment and installed a new wire harness from Rhode Island Wiring Service. When we received the engine back from Mike, Lloyd painted it and installed it back in the car. As you can see from the photo it turned out like new, thanks to Lloyd Duzell.

Gene and I have always called this our "Anniversary Car" because we were married in the year of 1951.




FROM THE EDITORS

Marvel Mystery Oil and the Ampco Lubricator By Ken Bounds

NIRG members who attend our Installation Dinners know that there are always some nice door prizes awarded. This year, no doubt one of the first items to go will be a very special donation, an Ampco Top Cylinder Lubricator, courtesy of Ampco Lubricators LLC of New Milford, CT. This month we will discuss why you would want to be the winner of this door prize and how you can team up the Ampco Lubricator with Marvel Mystery Oil to help protect and improve the performance of your flathead engine.



Today's gasolines are undoubtedly of better quality than the gasoline available when our V-8's were new. Modern gasoline burns cleaner, spark plugs last longer, and pinging is largely a thing of the past. But ingredients that have been taken out of gasoline (lead) and put into gasoline (alcohol or ethanol) can cause problems for our flathead engines. After all, the technology of these engines is over 75 years old! But who could have known that a product developed in 1923 would be the elixir that would allow our antique engines to run without damage from modern gasolines?

In 1923, automotive engineer Burt N. Pierce, who had invented the Marvel carburetor, the standard of its day, left his job as a consultant with GM and incorporated the Marvel Oil Company in Chicago. He began selling his Marvel Mystery Oil to clean and maintain carburetor jets which were easily clogged by the high lead content of gasoline. The product proved to have other benefits as an upper cylinder lubricant. By creating a top ring seal, it produced higher compression and, by preventing blow-by on

power strokes, it resulted in more power. Mystery Oil also improved gas mileage and minimized engine wear. According to the company, the formula of Marvel Mystery Oil (called Mystery because the formula is a secret) has been unchanged since its development. Marvel Oil moved to New York City early on, then in 1941 to its long-time home in Port Chester, New York. Its 1999 acquisition by Turtle Wax, Inc. brought Marvel Oil back home to Chicago.

For decades tetra-ethyl lead was used as a gasoline additive primarily to increase octane, but it also acted as a lubricant which prevented the valve and seat materials from sticking to and eroding each other. Due to environmental concerns and potential fouling of catalytic converters, lead was largely phased out of gasoline over 20 years ago. Starting in approximately 1979 as lead was being phased out, gasoline manufacturers began adding MTBE (Methyl tertiary-butyl ether) to increase octane. Because of serious health concerns about MTBE, ethanol started replacing it and MTBE was almost completely eliminated from American gasolines by the end of 2006. Other considerations, including reduction of dependence on oil and improvements to the environment have increased the use of ethanol. Although this gasoline burns cleaner, it also burns dryer and hotter. Modern engines have been designed to accommodate these changes, but our flatheads were not.

When added to gasoline, Marvel Mystery Oil, or MMO, can restore the lubrication benefits that lead formerly provided. It also provides lubrication for the upper cylinder heat-wear zone of our engines to offset the effects of these hotter, dryer fuels. When added to the oil, MMO reduces and prevents valve

sticking and clatter by breaking down harmful deposits of carbon and sludge. Marvel recommends adding MMO to gasoline at the rate of 4 ounces per 10 gallons of gas. When added to the crankcase, a concentration of no more than 25% of MMO should be used, or basically one quart per oil change.

While there is some dispute over the long-term use of MMO in the oil, there seems to be little argument against the use of MMO as a gasoline additive for our V-8 engines. If you visit certain Internet forums devoted to the Early Ford flathead, including the Early Ford V-8 Club site (www.efv8.org) or the Fordbarn (www.fordbarn.com), you

will see frequent recommendations about the benefits of adding MMO to gasoline by some of the "old-timers" who know what they are talking about. MMO is available at most auto parts stores, Ace and TrueValue hardware stores, and WalMart. It is usually stocked in 16- and 32-ounce sizes, but some outlets carry or can order one gallon or five gallon jugs.

If you decide to regularly use MMO as a gasoline additive, one of the difficulties is getting the right mixture; forgetting to add at each fill-up, or just having a problem accurately measuring out 4 ounces, especially when you are out on the road. One solution is to mount a top cylinder lubricator in your flathead. The Marvel Oiler is long out of production and you would be quite lucky to find one, even on eBay. Fortunately, thanks to George Folchi of New Milford, CT, you can still purchase an NOS Original Ampco Lubricator. George advertises the Ampco Lubricator in each issue of the V-8 times and there was an excellent article about the product beginning on page 27 of the September/October 2007 issue. The website is www.ampcolubes.com.

The Ampco Lubricator comes as a kit including a jar to hold the top cylinder oil (Marvel Mystery Oil is recommended), a bracket to attach the jar to the firewall, a metering nozzle, tubing, fittings, and instructions. It is best to add a carburetor plate that is installed between the carburetor and intake manifold. A special plate is now available for our

flathead V-8's.

In addition to providing a convenient reservoir for the MMO so you don't have to remember to add it when filling the gas tank, the Ampco Lubricator provides for the introduction of a completely dispersed oil spray or vapor into the intake manifold of an engine. The Ampco unit operates to meter a minimum quantity of oil into the line and discharge it below the point of carburetion as an oil spray,

throughout the complete normal range of engine vacuum. Since vacuum is created within an engine on the intake stroke, the oil spray is distributed evenly to each cylinder before ignition occurs to provide pre-lubrication of parts within the upper cylinder section of an engine.

We are grateful to George Folchi for his generous donation of an Ampco Lubricator kit to our group for our Installation Dinner. All the more reason to attend the dinner on January 12 – maybe you will be the lucky winner. But even if you don't win, you still have a chance to buy the Original Ampco Lubricator at an attractive price. George has offered to sell us the kits for a reduced price if the club members buy 8 units. If you are interested, please contact any NIRG officer.

New Illinois Laws for 2008

Most people have probably heard about the smoking ban that takes effect on January 1 in Illinois. The smoking ban prohibits smoking in public places, places of employment and governmental vehicles. Additionally, smoking is prohibited within a minimum distance of 15 feet from entrances, exits, windows that open, and ventilation intakes that serve an enclosed area where smoking is prohibited. No-smoking signs must be

posted and ashtrays must be removed from areas where smoking is prohibited.

While the legislation does restrict smoking in most public areas, there are a few notable exceptions.

- Private residences or dwelling places, except when used as a child care, adult day care, or healthcare facility or any other home-based business open to the public.
- Private and semi-private rooms in nursing homes and long-term care facilities that are occupied by
 one or more persons, all of whom are smokers and have requested in writing to be placed or to remain in a room where smoking is permitted and the smoke shall not infiltrate other areas of the
 nursing home.
- Hotel and motel sleeping rooms that are rented to guests and are designated as smoking rooms, provided that all smoking rooms on the same floor must be contiguous and smoke from these rooms must not infiltrate into nonsmoking rooms or other areas where smoking is prohibited. Not more than 25% of the rooms rented to guests in a hotel or motel may be designated as rooms where smoking is allowed. The status of rooms as smoking or nonsmoking may not be changed, except to permanently add additional nonsmoking rooms.

Here are some other notable new Illinois laws for 2008

Under **House Bill 369**, gift certificates and gift cards cannot expire nor have their value reduced, as long as they are used within a five-year time frame. Previously, reductions in the value of gift cards and expiration dates were set by the issuer of the certificates.

Another new law, **Senate Bill 140**, prohibits anyone younger than 19 years old who has a driving permit from using cellular phones while driving, except in case of emergency. In addition, House Bill 518 will allow parents to access the driving records of their teenagers while they have a graduated driver's license.

Roadside Memorial (HB 1900/P.A. 95-0398) – Allows IDOT to erect and maintain roadside markers to identify the locations where victims were killed in DUI accidents.

Protecting Pets (HB 9/P.A. 95-0009) – Allows pets to be included in an order of protection for abused individuals, because animals are occasionally used as a way to intimidate or retaliate against victims of abuse.

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
