

Fifty Years with my Thirty-Four By Paul Jensen

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I purchased my 1934 Ford 3 Window Coupe out of an ad in the Sunday Chicago Tribune in December 1959 from a guy around 85th & Western in Chicago. The price was \$250 and I

had to borrow some of the money in order to buy the car. The guy I bought it from said he got it from a farmer and there was even some hav in the trunk. The car had been in a barn that burned and there was a dent in the edge of the roof where a board hit it, but not real bad. It really was a nice, original, almost rust-free car. There was only one rust spot on the right side of the body where the rear window pan drains. Years later, Lloyd Duzell repaired that area for me.

At the time of the purchase, the car ran good until we got about a mile from the guy's house. It stopped running and we could not get it to start, so we pushed it to the curb and drove to my friend's house to get a tow bar. I found out later it had a cracked block. This all took place on a Sunday night about 10:00 p.m. with an outside temperature of 15 degrees! We got back to the car and, thank God, it was still there as we had been gone for over an hour. I had to remove the front bumper to attach the tow bar. We finally got the car to my girlfriend's house (later to be my wife) and put the car in her garage. It stayed there in storage as I had my daily driver to take care of – a 1940 Ford Standard Coupe with DeSoto hemi engine, originally built by Andy Granatelli.

In about 1962 I started to take the '34 apart. My original idea was to make a hot rod; chopped top and all the good stuff at the time. I took the fenders off, stripped the paint off the body, and sprayed it with primer. During this process I got notice from Uncle Sam that I had been drafted August 11, 1963. After two years in the 4th Infantry Division, I got out August 10, 1965, and went back to work at my old job rebuilding engines at an automotive machine shop, Variety Auto Supply on Fullerton Avenue in Chicago. One of my fellow workers, Rich Carlson, who was into restoring cars, talked me into restoring my '34. I'm sure glad that he did or it would have been gone a long time ago.

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So, I started a body off, ground up restoration. New everything I could find. I even made a complete stainless steel exhaust system to copy the original. I got most of the accessories: ash tray radio, dual temp gauge, aftermarket Oil Chex gauge, rearview mirror clock, dual wipers, Kelsey-Hayes 17" wheels, and beauty rings. I finished the car in about 1975 and the first show was with the Northern Illinois Regional Group at Grayslake. At that show, a fellow offered me \$25,000 for the car. At that time it was only worth about \$12,000. Lucky for me, it was my first time out with the car and I said no. Another good move for me or I would not have it today.

After total restoration, every time I drove the car any distance it overheated. I tried everything I could think of to stop the overheating, but nothing seemed to work. After 500 miles I got fed up and parked it in the garage. Some years later I read a story in the V-8 Times about guys getting motors out of junk vards and overheating. The reason is that in the old days the motors only used water in the summer and alcohol in the winter. Rust would build up in the block and rust flakes would fall down between the cylinders and prevent the correct amount of water for cooling at the bottom of the cylinders. Bingo! Maybe this is my problem? I filled my system with water, drained and measured the amount, and sure enough, I was about three quarts shy of where it should be. I made

some block-off plates, sealed the motor, and filled it with a Sno-Bol and water mix. I flushed the block out, installed some new aluminum heads and started it up. Sure enough, it worked. So, 26 years after I parked the '34 I am driving it again. My final project this year is taking out the 4.11 rear gear and installing a 3.54. This will be nice so I will be able to go on the highway and almost keep up with the traffic.

Hopefully this year I can add some miles to the 500 I have put on the car. So, I guess I will call it a keeper!

Editors Note: We are grateful to Paul for contributing this interesting article for the 75th Anniversary of the classic 1934 Ford. Incredible that he has owned this car for 50 years this year! Paul was one of the earliest members of the Northern Illinois Regional Group, joining in September 1973.

Paul's Three Window Coupe is painted Dearborn Blue and sports the Deluxe trim. The V-8 Model 40 is one of 26,348 made (there were actually 7 built with a 4 cylinder engine). The original price of the coupe was \$555, so Paul got a good deal – more than 50% off.

It Worked for Me – Fuel Tank Maintenance By Ken Bounds

Joe Kozmic had two problems with the fuel tank on his '37 Coupe which were exacerbated by early Ford designs. After many years of working correctly, the fuel gauge went haywire, only registering about ¹/₄ even with a full tank. So, the answer seems to be: Keep it full, right? That brings up the second problem. Any time Joe filled the tank there was a leak by the filler tube, so he really didn't like to keep the tank full. We decided to take on both problems.

The first thing to do was diagnose the faulty gas gauge. Let's hope it is something as simple as a bad ground. No such luck. We used a volt meter to check the entire circuit and found no problems. Since the dash gauge did at least show ¼ tank, we hoped it was not defective. We removed the sending unit from the fuel tank and began to see the problem. Reconnecting the sending unit with jumper wires, we could see that it and the dash gauge actually were working. It didn't take long to determine what had gone wrong. Most early Fords used a cork float on the fuel gauge sending unit. (Later units use a brass float.) Joe's had worked fine for nearly 70 years. Why did it suddenly fail? Basically, those corks were coated with an orange shellac to prevent them from being saturated with gasoline. That worked great until enough alcohol

was added to fuels to dissolve the shellac. Now the old cork became saturated with gasoline and lost its buoyancy.

Rather than trying a new protective coating on the old cork float, we ordered a new epoxy-coated Model A cork from <u>Mac's Antique Auto Parts</u>. Unfortunately, it is only about half the size of the V-8 cork. We thought about trying two corks, but decided to try one to see if it provided enough buoyancy to properly control the gauge. We reinstalled the sending unit and verified that we had a good ground. Sure enough, the gauge was now working properly. Time will tell if the epoxy coating holds up OK to modern fuels and if the smaller size of the float is adequate. If anything goes wrong, we will likely replace the arm on the sending unit with one where we can attach a brass float.

Next, we took on the leak. Ford's fuel tanks through early '37 used a threaded filler tube with a lead seal between the tank and the flange on the tube. Later tanks had a much easier-to-seal arrangement of a hose connecting the filler tube to a tube on the tank. Leaks on the early fuel tanks are apparently pretty common as I have the same problem on my '36 and I know of a few others who do as well. The lead seal is available from the typical parts suppliers for about \$8. You need a special spanner wrench to remove the filler pipe. I bought one from Sears for \$15. (Armstrong model 34-219).

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Roundhead's Roundup By Ken Bounds

The original title of this article was supposed to be "Roundhead's Flathead Roundup", but the weather put an end to that. One week ago, Saturday's weather was sunny and in the 60's. But on March 28, the cold day saw rain and sleet. Needless to say, there were no V-8's in the parking lot, but that didn't prevent 11 NIRG members from getting together to have dinner and a good time. This was just an informal gathering at a restaurant named <u>Roundhead's</u> on Roosevelt Road in Lombard. The evening was supposed to include some tire kicking in the parking lot – maybe next time.

Everyone agreed that the food and drinks were very good and the service was terrific. Thanks go to President Dan Pudelek for suggesting the venue and making the arrangements. Those participating were Dan, Ken & Carolyn Bounds, Don & Elaine Braun, Stan Gaynor, Joe & Nell Kozmic, Joey Novak, and Joe & Delice Serritella. It was great to see Don at this event. With a lot of people waiting for a table, and being prodded by a small leak that developed in the roof above Joe & Delice, we called it a night. We hope to try this event again soon when there is better weather for our V-8's.

Tech Corner Continued

On Joe's car we sprayed penetrating oil on the threads where the filler tube enters the fuel tank. Removing a fender support bracket provided easier access to the tube. The pin on the spanner wrench is inserted in the holes on the filler tube, which is then just screwed off. The entire assembly is then removed through the filler hole in the fender. I suspected the lead seal may have been missing, but one was there. Perhaps it was distorted and not sealing properly. We cleaned up all surfaces, inserted the new lead seal into the opening in the fuel tank, and screwed the filler pipe back in, tightening it securely with the spanner wrench.

Now for the leak test. We drove to the gas station and pumped about 6 gallons into the tank. The gas gauge now read about ³/₄ or better full. No leaks yet! We are hoping the problem is solved, but so far, so good. Looking back, I guess the title of the article should be "It worked for Joe. So far." At least, if the tank leaks or the fuel gauge stops working again, we have some ideas about further repairs. We'll let you know. As soon as I get my Roadster out of storage, I'll be doing the same repairs and <u>then</u> can say "It worked for <u>me</u>."

Tech Talk:

Joe Serritella gave a tech talk on rebuilding starters. In addition to comparing photos of salvageable and unsalvageable parts, Joe pointed out that early Ford starters are more rugged and have more torque than GM starters from the same period. He also told us that Ford starters did not change from 1932-1955. When rebuilding a starter, if the gaps get too far out of spec, you'll generate more heat than torque. Another tip: you can run a 6 volt starter with 12 volts if you add a shunt to slow down the rotation. Joe advised that costs for replacement starter parts (field coils, armature windings and pole shoes) have tripled in the last few years. Joe's company is Vintage Voltage—look for his ad on Page 15 of the Road Chatter.

Here's something that I found on that site that could make a different looking centerpiece or can give you something to do with the grandkids.


PEEPS Flowerpot Topiary

What you need:

- 1 terracotta pot
- Pastel-colored acrylic paint
- Assorted PEEPS marshmallow shapes
- 2 white foam balls, large enough to fill pot
- Tree branch or wooden dowel
- Easter grass
- Jelly Beans
- Toothpicks

To prepare:

- 1. Paint the terracotta pot and let dry.
- 2. Insert one foam ball into the pot. Cover with Easter grass and sprinkle with jelly beans.
- 3. For the faux topiary, insert branch or wooden dowel in to the foam ball in pot. Attach other foam ball at the top of the branch or dowel.
- 4. Secure PEEPS marshmallow shapes to the top ball using toothpicks until completely covered. Push toothpicks in far enough to hide them from view.


