Food - Drinks - 50-50 Raffle -Auction


The club provides: Tables, chairs, tent, water, grills, plates, utensils

Weekend Driving Tour to Door County "Excursion à la porte des morts" By Ken Bounds

On July 10, 15 V-8ers met at the Town & Country Mall in Arlington Heights for our weekend driving tour to Door County, WI. There was a threat of rain all along our route, but that didn't dampen the enthusiasm nor scare away the classic cars. The group consisted of Ken & Carolyn Bounds – '50 Convertible, Tom & Judy Buscaglia – '51 Tudor, Lloyd & Gladys Duzell – '35 Tudor, Earl & Gene Heintz – modern (thanks to an uncooperative carburetor), Joe & Nell Kozmic – '37 Coupe, our tour organizer Joey Novak – '40 Pickup, Dan & Diane Pudelek – '53 Victoria, and Joe & Delice Ser-

ritella – '50 Oldsmobile.

We headed north out of the Chicago area on secondary roads and hit some light rain around the Wisconsin state line. In just a few miles the rain was left behind us and was no longer a part of our weekend, except for an overnight shower later that night. As we approached Milwaukee we joined Interstates until our "traditional" lunch stop at the Lighthouse Inn on Lake Michigan in Two Rivers, WI. The food, the service, and the view were outstanding.



After lunch we followed scenic Wisconsin

Highway 42 up the peninsula to our weekend destination, the Church Hill Inn bed & breakfast in Sister Bay. What a great place Joey selected for us to stay! Everyone agreed that the rooms were spacious, comfortable, and nicely furnished. The staff at the Inn was friendly and helpful. After we

For dinner, we elected to try the fish fry at a classic American supper club, the Sister Bay Bowl. has some hills! It was an easy decision to drive. The popular restaurant was packed, so we enjoyed ourselves at the bar until we could be seated. The food was very good and served in a nice atmosphere. After dinner a few of us enjoyed more conversation on the porch back at the Inn before turning in for the night.

Saturday morning our group gathered for a very nice buffet breakfast prepared by the Inn's chef. There was a nice variety which everyone seemed to enjoy, as well as attentive service by the staff. While two couples made plans for shopping and touring on their own, the rest of our group loaded up in the V-8's and made our way to the tip of the peninsula for our ferry crossing of "Death's Door" to Washington Island. History and folklore have dubbed the strait between Door Peninsula and Washington Island, littered with shipwrecks, as Death's Door, hence the nickname of our tour, "Excursion à la porte des morts" - French for "Excursion to the door of the dead "

Our group of 6 V-8's arrived early for our crossing. Coincidentally, the ferry was just pulling out as we arrived. When he learned that our entire group was present, the ferry captain came back for us. Now that is service! It is always a neat sight seeing our classic cars driving on to the ferry. In about 30 minutes we had defied death and made it safely to Washington Island. Once on the island, our plan was simple: to just take a leisurely, meandering drive on the many miles of paved roads to see where they led us. We stopped along the shore for a photo opportunity, then took a drive to a tower described as a scenic lookout over the island. Because of the climb of 200 or so steps to the observation platform, only a few of us took the challenge. As we



collected our breath we all agreed that the view may not have been adequate reward for the effort. Our drive also took us to the Jackson Harbor Maritime museum where we saw many local artifacts along with a Ford Model A equipped with snow tracks and skis. Neat item!

While two couples went on a quest for ice cream, the remaining 7 of us stopped for lunch at Nelson's Hall, a restaurant/pub that was built in 1899. Carolyn and I went for a tourist tradition, joining the Bitters Club by downing a shot of Angostura Bitters. After lunch we did a little shopping, then lined up for our ferry ride back to the peninsula. During our wait Captain Richard Purinton, who also happens to be com-

pany president of the Washington Island Ferry Line, stopped by to take pictures of our cars. Captain Purinton writes a blog for the Ferry Line and featured our crossing in his <u>July 14 edition</u>. Our return trip through choppy waters was a bit exciting, but harmless. Back in Door County we continued with a few shopping stops on our way back to the Inn. We took advantage of the bright sun and cool breeze and sat out by the cars for some more conversation before breaking up to get ready for dinner. It was about a 20-minute cruise in our V-8s to another delightful restaurant chosen by Joey, the English Inn near Fish Creek, WI. The food and service were fantastic. Everyone seemed to have a great time.

Every place we went over the weekend our cars were a big hit. In the parking lot of the Inn, on the road, on the ferry to Washington Island, on our tour around the island, and in our travels through Door County. We received countless smiles, waves, and "thumbs up" and fielded many questions about the cars. People just love classic cars.

Unfortunately, all good things must come to an end, and Sunday morning marked the beginning of our last day of the tour. We had another delicious breakfast at the Inn, then began preparing for the

TECH CORNER



As we prepare for the Central National Meet in Auburn, this month's Tech Corner is an updated version of our Top Ten Touring Tips from a few years ago.

Top Ten Touring Tips

-or-

It's the Drive, Not the Destination

- 10. <u>If you can't bring a V-8, don't be afraid to drive modern iron</u>. The important thing is to get out there, enjoy the drive, and the tour with your fellow V-8 enthusiasts. If you can drive your V-8, by all means do so. But please, don't pass up a tour because your V-8 is not available or you don't currently have one. Your tour partners will be glad you came and heck, if someone breaks down you may be the most popular person on the tour!
- 9. <u>Bring spare parts</u>. As much as you try to keep your V-8 in tip-top shape, things sometimes go wrong. It never hurts to have an assortment of spare parts in your trunk, especially on longer or overnight tours. Opinions vary of course as to what you should have on hand, so just try to think of things you may have problems with or items that are not too difficult to change on the road. Some ideas: radiator hoses; fan belts; brake light switch; fuses; spare bulbs headlight, taillight, etc; fuel pump; distributor; points, rotor, coil, condenser; carburetor. If you have the space, consider water pumps, generator, and starter. Don't forget fluids. Bring some oil. Bring water for your radiator, or if you use anti-freeze, pre-mix some 50/50 and bring a gallon or two.
- 8. <u>Stay in touch bring a cell phone</u>. There are so many reasons to carry a cell phone while touring in an antique car that it hardly seems necessary to list them. They are great for getting in touch with someone if you have an emergency or breakdown. Be sure to share your cell number with others on the tour and get their numbers too!
- 7. <u>Bring a copy of the NIRG roster and the EFV8 Club roster</u>. Who you gonna call with that cell phone? A copy of the NIRG roster is great to have in case someone doesn't show up at a meeting point. The National roster has saved many V-8ers when they are touring around the country and need some help or advice.
- X-CID-X
 - 6. <u>Rain-X your windshield</u>. It is going to rain. I know you checked the forecast. I know we have been in a severe drought for two years. I know your wipers are just fine. They aren't and it is going to rain. Apply Rain-X to your windshield now and thank me later.
- 5. Get an I-Pass for your V-8. The I-Pass has been a great way to avoid fumbling for change in your V-8 for years and is all but mandatory since cash tolls are double. Here are a few things you may not know about the I-Pass. There is now only one account balance required for multiple I-Pass transponders (usually \$40). You simply pay a \$10 deposit for each unit, so why not get

one for each car? You also may legally move the I-Pass between cars; however, you must register each additional car with I-Pass to avoid a violation fine. All it takes is a call to <u>800-UCI-PASS</u>. Did you know you can also get an I-Pass that mounts to the front license plate instead of the windshield?

Just ask for the License Plate Tag (LPT) model. You may think it looks slightly less dorky than the windshield mounted model.

- 4. <u>Use your I-Pass in Illinois and all the states that accept E-ZPass</u>. The I-Pass is of course accepted in all toll lanes throughout the Illinois tollway system and on the Chicago Skyway. But did you know that you can also use your I-Pass on all toll roads and bridges that accept E-ZPass? Toll roads in Indiana and 11 Eastern states accept the I-Pass. Just be sure to watch for the E-ZPass logo over the toll lanes not every lane accepts transponders as they do here in Illinois. Unfortunately, the Ohio Turnpike still requires cash, but will convert to E-ZPass late in 2009.
- 3. <u>Don't fall too far behind the car in front of you</u>. Leave room for braking, but try to stay close to the car in front of you so the group can stay together. Your leader probably cannot see all the cars in a convoy and needs your help in staying in touch. It is also a good idea to keep an eye on the car following you and to notify the leader or someone in front of you if you or someone behind you gets caught by a stop light or has fallen out of sight.
- 2. Stay in touch bring a CB Radio. If you have never brought a CB radio with you on a tour, you don't know what you are missing! Cell phones are nice for person-to-person communication and emergencies, but you can't beat the CB for communicating in a group. The CB radio is invaluable for determining when and where to stop for meals, for arranging gas and rest stops, and for letting your touring partners just know how your car is doing. But the lively banter can be even more fun. You learn so much more about things you see and things that happen out on the road when you have a CB. There are many varieties of CB radios available, from professional models that you can permanently mount under the dash to handheld models. You can use a big CB antenna for great distance reception, a hidden antenna under the running board, or a CB antenna disguised as a radio antenna. Even the built-in antennas on hand-helds work well when you are fairly close. If your car is still 6-volt, no problem. You can consider running a 12-volt converter or even place a 12-volt battery under the hood or in the trunk. BRING YOUR CB!
- 1. <u>Have fun</u>. By all means, come prepared to have some fun. Hopefully the tour can be arranged so there is plenty of time to arrive at each destination so you can enjoy the sights and sounds along the way. Much of the fun about being in an antique car club is getting the old cars out and driving them. (They DO have wheels on them, right?) Remember, "It's the Drive, Not the Destination".

Hail to the Martini!

It's that time of year again. It's cocktail time! This is our third annual V-8 Gals cocktail issue. This year we'll be investigating the martini.

In my opinion the martini has come a long way since the days of a "shaken not stirred" drink that men enjoyed during their martini lunches. While that original martini is still popular the martini seems to have undergone a transformation. Now there are all sorts of creative concoctions that have fun festive names that are made with all sorts of liquors and dare I say that they can even be "healthy".

One of the reasons I like the V-8 Gals cocktail issue is that I get to experiment. The martini is something new to me so I don't have all the required accourrements like the traditional martini glass, the shaker or the strainer so I had to improvise. I used just a regular glass, chilled the ingredients and just stirred it up. Here are a few that tasted great to me.

Cloud Nine Martini - We were introduced to this drink at the English Inn in Door County Wisconsin. It has a nice creamy coffee taste that reminds you more of a dessert than a drink.

I recreated this drink using equal parts vodka, amaretto, Kahlua and Bailey's Irish Cream. Combine ingredients in a cocktail shaker with cracked ice and shake well. Strain into a chilled cocktail glass.



Cosmopolitan Martini - A very popular drink.

This is made with 4 parts vodka, 2 parts triple sec, 2 parts cranberry juice and 1 part fresh lime juice. Combine ingredients in a cocktail shaker with cracked ice and shake well. Strain into a chilled cocktail glass.

Pomegranate Martini - A girlfriend called while I was experimenting with the Cloud Nine Martini. She shared with me this drink that her husband makes her. We spent a few minutes talking about the health benefits of pomegranates and justifying why this drink is good for our health. I sure hope that's true...if it's not, I don't want to know. I used POM Pomegranate Blueberry juice in this drink. Thought I'd go for more antioxidants with the blueberries. If you want to get fancy you could rub a slice of lemon around the rim of the glass and roll the glass in sugar. This gives it a nice presentation.

This is made with 2 parts pomegranate juice, 1 part vodka and 1 part lemonade. Combine ingredients in a cocktail shaker with cracked ice and shake well. Strain into a chilled cocktail glass.

If you are a drinking V-8 gal, I hope you enjoy these drinks. I sure had a good time experimenting, although I don't think Ken enjoyed it as much as I did. I'm already looking forward to next year!


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
