Munz Collection Tour - Saturday, June 13



Mr. Munz has requested that only classic cars arrive at his location, so members driving V-8's will be glad to share rides with those of you who do not own or have V-8 Fords available.



If you intend to drive on your own, plan to arrive at the location at noon. If you would like to caravan with other members, Ken Bounds will be leading a group leaving from the strip mall by Stadium Inn at Algonquin and 53 (West of 53, South side of Algonquin) in Rolling Meadows. To be in Madison on time, we will be leaving promptly at 8:00 a.m. We will be taking the Northwest Tollway/I-90 to Madison, so be sure to bring your I-Pass. For those who live North or West of the meeting place and would like to meet us on the road, we will plan a stop at the Belvidere Oasis, near milepost 54.5. Frank Koeder will lead us to Madison from there.

<u>Driving Directions</u> – You can arrive in Madison, near the collection, From I-90/I-39, Route 12, or Route 14. From the Interstate or Route 12, take Route 12 West about 5 miles past the Interstate to Exit 263, John Molen Dr. From Route 14, go East on Route 12 2 miles to Exit 263. Take John Molen Dr. across the lake and follow it around the turns to E. Washington Ave. Turn right on E. Washington for 1 block, left on Blount St. for 3 blocks, then right on Johnson St. about 1½ blocks to 852 E Johnson.

As noted in the talk, all of the handouts provided are available on our club website. Go to www.nirgv8.org and click on National Meets. We have taken information from the Club's Judging Manual (available in the annual Roster) and the club website and tried to make it useful to members in one place. The talk included how to determine whether you should have your car judged and what division or class you should enter at National Meets. There was also a presentation on all the judging sheets used by meet judges and how you can use them as an aid when restoring your V-8 or getting it ready to be judged. Handouts were provided on each classification of cars entered at National Meets, judges instructions, owners instructions, and specific judging sheets for 32-48 Fords and 49-53 Fords. We had a detailed discussion on what qualifies for a Dearborn Award, a Dearborn Medallion, and Dearborn Emeritus. We also compared the differences between Touring and Touring A divisions.

Garry Kelly went home \$18 richer by winning the 50/50 raffle. The club did OK too.

Power Steering in a '36 Ford By Ken Bounds

Well, not really power steering, but a big step in that direction. This month I would like to share with you my experience in installing a modern bearing to replace the worn upper steering column bushing in my '36 Roadster.

Early V-8's used a hard rubber bushing at the top of the steering column to support the shaft in the steering tube. The bushing was probably barely effective when new, and after 70+ years becomes brittle and worn. Pre-1937 V-8's are not known to steer easily and the old, ineffective bushing tends to multiply steering effort. V-8 Club member Dan Brusegard of Minnesota engineered, manufactures, and sells a precision two-piece bearing to replace the bushing in 1932 to 1939 V-8's. About a year ago I purchased one of Dan's bearings, but due to other priorities did not get it installed – until this month. Some of you may recall that I showed the bearing at our July meeting last year and explained its use.

Replacing the old bushing was really not that difficult; Dan provides excellent instructions and illustrations to aid the process. The first step (and likely the biggest concern for closed car and pickup owners), is removing the horn/light switch rod. On my '36, all I needed to do was snap off the bail holding the light switch "can", remove the switch, and press up on the light switch spider to remove the retainer clip. With the top down, the rod is easily removed. On a closed car, you may need to drop the steering column to get enough room to remove the rod. A pickup will likely require removal of the rear window.

Next, the steering wheel is removed. I was dreading this step since I don't have a proper puller for old steering wheels. I needn't have worried, however, as the wheel lifted right off after removing the 15/16" nut that fastens it to the steering shaft. For your wheel you may need a puller. With the steering wheel removed, the bushing is now visible. The next challenge is to dig it out. I drilled a hole on each side of the bushing, turned in some 4"

deck screws, and wiggled the bushing out. Then I was able to thoroughly clean the steering column shaft and tube with solvent and an old toothbrush to remove all the old gunk.

Installation of the new bearing was a snap. I just slid it down over the steering shaft, being careful to keep the inner and outer pieces together. Dan provides a tool to assist in driving the bearing down over the shaft as it fits snugly inside the tube. On '32 Fords the bearing is driven down to 1/16" below the top of the tube. For '33 to '39 Fords the bearing is driven down flush with the bottom of the flare at the end of the tube. For final placement, the inner race is lifted up 1/16-1/8" with the provided, shortened, Allen wrench and the two set screws are snugged to the shaft. This prevents binding between the two parts of the bearing. To verify proper operation, I temporarily replaced the steering wheel to check for any scraping or binding. Then I removed the wheel and securely fastened the set screws.

After reinstalling the steering wheel and tightening the nut, I checked one more thing. I used a volt meter to check continuity of the horn button circuit. I then replaced the horn rod, replaced the spring, spider, and retaining clip on the end, and reattached the light switch. Before a road test, I verified that the horn and lights worked properly.

The road test was nothing but good news. What a difference this bearing makes! Much less effort is required and it feels like you are actually steering instead of fighting the wheel. I am aware that there are other, lowerpriced, bearing and bushing solutions available from the typical vendors, but I am a big fan of this one.

I paid about \$42 for the bearing, plus shipping. Based on the improvement in steering and the obvious quality of the part, I consider it a bargain. Dan told me a year ago that he had made up enough of these bearings to last about a year. I don't know the status of his stock at this

30 Years Ago This Month - June 1979




