November 7, 2009 – 12:00 noon



As we arrived just after 11:30 at Mad Dan's for lunch, we were joined by Larry & Jerry Webb in modern iron. Our group filled two large tables and we went over the procedure for our poker run over the weekend. The plan was for each participant to draw a card at seven stops along the way, with prizes awarded at each stop and the grand prizes to be awarded at dinner Saturday evening. We toured again over a nice secondary route to the outskirts of Elkhorn where a huge table awaited us at the packed Moose Creek Bar & Grill. While many enjoyed one of the fish fry selections, others ordered from the menu. The food and drinks were great and the conversation lively. We drew card number three. As the participants' hands began to take shape, Jerry Webb was awarded a tin of Wisconsin Maple Syrup for drawing the high Club.

We drove our flatheads back to the hotel under darkened skies with the gentle rumble of glasspacks and dual exhausts contrasting with the quiet purr of the more stock vehicles. After a few hours of camaraderie in the lobby, day one came to an end.

After a good night's sleep, most of the guys were up early to wipe down and spritz the cars for our driving tour to New Glarus. As everyone gathered for breakfast we drew card number four. Larry Webb had the highest Heart, winning a New Glarus Brewery t-shirt. Now it was time to begin our driving tour, starting through downtown Delavan. As we neared the business district, a squad car with lights flashing jumped ahead of us and led us through the main streets to the outskirts of town. Over the C-B radio came some compliments about arranging the escort, but alas it was just a coincidence. We went west over a really nice back-roads route for our 63-mile tour to New Glarus. It is always nice to look back and see that long line of Early V-8's as they climbed over the gentle hills of Southern Wisconsin.

As we arrived in the quaint village we could see that much of the downtown was already parked up because of the Oktoberfest celebration. Fortunately, we knew of a nearby parking area by the old train depot. From this vantage point we were able to map out our day's activities and draw card #5. Nell Kozmic won a package of New Glarus bread mix by drawing the high Spade. We descended onto the closed-off streets where we enjoyed the Oktoberfest tent, the Swiss-style architecture of the village, and many other attractions. New Glarus Brewery had several of their beer varieties available in the tent. There was also wine tasting in the tent and in the nearby Primrose Winery. Music was everywhere, from the Bavarian Brass Band in the tent, to the man playing the huge Alphorn (like in the Ricola commercials), to the lady playing an accordion accompanied by her granddaughter singing. We did some shopping in the various stores, cheese shops, sausage shops, and candy shops. Most of our group enjoyed a hearty lunch at the crowded Glarner Stube restaurant where the service was great and the food was plentiful and tasty.



After about four hours of Oktoberfest fun, we began to gather again at the cars for our drive over to the Swiss Historical Village Museum. Before going in, we drew card #6. Joe Kozmic took a pair of New Glarus Brewery pint glasses with the high Diamond. The museum is basically a collection of 14 original or re-created buildings depicting the early lives of the settlers who arrived in 1845 from the Canton of Glarus in Switzerland. We had a knowledgeable and enthusiastic guide, Steve Gmur, who detailed how the settlers found the land, their long, hard journey to the "new world", and many details about early life. We spent over an hour touring the 14 buildings, including an early settler's cabin, a bee house, a church, a school, a firehouse, a cheese fac-

tory (this IS in Wisconsin – in 1905 New Glarus had 22 cheese factories), a smoke house, a blacksmith shop, a print shop, and more. At each building, Steve gave an interesting presentation about the uses of the building and how it fit into community life. Of the three "modern" fire trucks in the firehouse, one was a 1928 Model A, another was a 1941 Ford. Both seemed to be in great shape. The museum tour was a great time and well worth the price of admission.

Now it was time to load up the cars and begin our journey back to Delavan. We took a different route back, but it was as rural and scenic as the trip over. With our reliable V-8's making the trip without incident, we arrived back at the hotel with plenty of time to recount the day's events before gathering for dinner. While some of the group elected to seize the breakfast area for a carry-in dinner from the nearby KFC, others went out to restaurants of their choice. The highlight of the evening was the drawing of card #7. Marty Duling took the final minor prize – a New Glarus Brewery tote bag by drawing the high club. Now it was time for everyone to go over their hands to see how they fared. Yours truly, for the second year in a row, won a prize for the lowest hand -a 3,4,5,6,8 - fetching \$20. Irene

LaSalle Street Auto Row Car Show By Ken Bounds

On October 4, the Friends of LaSalle Street held their inaugural car show in Aurora. NIRG member Joe Dispensa is president of that organization. The goal of the group is to make this historic area of downtown Aurora vital again. Back in the 1920's, this block of LaSalle Street, between Downer Place and Benton Street, was known as "Auto Row." It was said that 15 of the 40 auto-related businesses in Aurora were located in this one block. Joe owns two buildings; one of them, the Theiss Building built around 1912, still has its original, working Otis elevator that was used to carry cars between floors. Back then, Buick, Maxwell, Apperson, and Baker Electric cars were sold from the building.

The car show included everything from antiques such as those from our Early V-8 era, to more mod-

ern muscle cars, to low rider customs, to a prototype electric car. NIRG members participating included Joe, who showed his '51 Ford Pickup project in his building; Ron Blum – '40 Fordor; Ken Bounds – '36 Roadster; Sam Iusi – Chevy Pickup; John Judge – '52 F2 Tow Truck; Joe Kozmic – '37 Coupe; Frank Madrigali – '51 F1 Pickup; Dan Pudelek – '53 Victoria; and Stan Stack – '53 Tudor.

The Best of Show award went very deservedly to a gorgeous 1941 Chrysler Woodie. Second place went to a 1930 Cord, third to a beautiful 1952 Hudson Hornet, while the President's Award went to our own Sam for his pickup.

Joe tells us that this will be an annual event and encourages everyone to consider displaying their cars again next year – date to be determined.

TECH CORNER



Some Interesting Facts about Illinois License Plates

The State of Illinois currently has a dizzying array of license plates for passenger cars and small trucks. You probably have seen many of them, but did you know that in addition to the "standard" plates (Passenger, Antique, Hearing Impaired, Disability, Amateur Radio, B-truck, RV, and Motorcycle) there are at least 29 specialty plates? These range from Organ Donor, to Eagle Scout, to Environmental, to Route 66. We don't have space to list them all. This does not even include 19 different Collegiate Plates, 28 different Military Recognition Plates, 6 Sporting Series Plates, Special Events Plates, and many more. So how did all this get started?

The State of Illinois began requiring registration of motor vehicles in 1907. In the first two years, 20,224 automobiles were registered. The Secretary of State's office did not issue license plates initially. Instead, they issued an aluminum disk to be attached to the dashboard – it was the owner's responsibility to furnish his own plates! These disks were used through 1917. The first license plates issued by the State came out in 1910 and were made of aluminum. By 1911, the State decided to issue two plates, front and rear, and to change the color each year. The design of the front plate changed several times over the next several years - it was ventilated to allow air flow to the radiator. In 1912 the front plate was perforated like a screen; in 1913 the background was cut away, leaving only the numbers; and from 1914 through 1918 the front plate had slots between the numbers.

In 1925 the number of vehicles registered in Illinois exceeded 1 million for the first time. Over the years several different companies received contracts to manufacture plates, but in 1933 a license plate shop was set up in Stateville Penitentiary to take over production. Because the quality of workmanship was so low, private companies resumed production of license plates in 1936. Prison labor would never again be used. From 1943 to 1948, be-

cause of WWII steel rationing, Illinois license plates were made of fiberboard. In 1948 the State began issuing special plates for disabled veterans. The next year, a V prefix was added to those plates; these numbers are still used today. The "Land of Lincoln" slogan was added to Illinois plates in 1954.

In 1956 Illinois converted to a standard size for plates; previously the number of digits determined the length. Antique plates first appeared in 1968 and could be used only for cars at least 35 years old and driven only to displays or exhibitions.

In 1978, the State issued the last of the annual plates. The 69-year run of annual license plate issuance was the longest in the nation. In 1979, Illinois became the 45th state to issue multi-year plates. These plates were used until 1984. The replacement plates issued in 1984 had to hold out 17 years until the current plates began appearing in 2001.

At the November 13 monthly meeting there was a lively discussion about the use of C-B radios on tours. This would bring an interesting response a couple of months later from a member of the Mission Trails



35 Years Ago This Month – November 1974

Those present also discussed the upcoming national vote on whether to include '49 to '53 Ford vehicles in the club – most were against it.

Flathead Flashback

Another in our series of original cartoons by member Bob Blackmore, this one published in the November 1979 Road Chatter.





I have to admit that I've been on a bit of a history kick lately, wanting to know a little bit more about all sorts of things. When the time came to start working on this month's V-8 Gals, I found myself drifting to web sites about the history of Thanksgiving. I have to say I was pretty ignorant on how Thanksgiving became a national holiday. I'm sharing what I learned in case I wasn't the only one with her head in the cranberry sauce.

- President George Washington declared the first national Thanksgiving Day Proclamation on Thursday, November 26, 1789.
- The second national Thanksgiving Day Proclamation was also issued by George Washington and was celebrated on February 19, 1795.
- Between 1795 and 1863, Thanksgiving was celebrated more at a state level. For example, the state of New York made Thanksgiving Day an annual custom in 1817.
- President Abraham Lincoln officially declared the last Thursday of November as the national day of Thanksgiving in 1863. This was based on the Thanksgiving letter writing campaign by Sarah Josepha Hale that she started in 1827. Sarah Hale is probably best known as the author of "Mary Had a Little Lamb".
- In 1939, Thanksgiving fell on the 5th Thursday of the month which shortened the time between Thanksgiving and Christmas. President Franklin D. Roosevelt changed the date to the fourth Thursday in November to allow for a longer Christmas shopping season to stimulate the economy.
- In 1941, Congress passed an official proclamation declaring the Thanksgiving will be observed on the fourth Thursday of November.

Chocolate Pecan Bars

1 1/4 cups all-purpose flour 1 can (14 oz) sweetened condensed milk

1 cup powdered sugar 1 egg

1/2 cup HERSHEY'S Cocoa 2 teaspoons vanilla extract

1 cup (2 sticks) cold butter or margarine 1 1/2 cups chopped pecans

- 1. Heat oven to 350°F (325°F for glass dish).
- 2. Stir together flour, sugar and cocoa in large bowl. Cut in butter until crumbly. Press firmly onto bottom of ungreased 13x9x2-inch baking pan.
- 3. Bake 15 minutes; remove from oven. Meanwhile, in medium bowl, beat sweetened condensed milk, egg and vanilla until well blended. Stir in pecans, spread mixture evenly over hot baked crust. Return to oven.
- 4. Bake 25 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool completely in pan on wire rack. Cut into bars. Cover; store in refrigerator. About 36 bars.




