Eggs & Eights - Sunday, April 11









Follow Up on My '51 Pickup Restoration By Joe Dispensa

As you know, progress takes time. I felt that I couldn't wait to tell you what I have learned about leaf springs. It really isn't very difficult to disassemble leaf springs if you have a gas wrench and some basic hand tools. The first time you replace a bushing it is an exciting experience. Frank Madrigali suggested driving a heated bushing out with an old socket, but I felt using a bushing remover tool would work great once I knew how to use it. Frank had the better idea.

Fellow NIRG V-8 members John Slobodnik and I are working on disassembling the spring leafs, degreasing, sandblasting, and replacing bushings, spraying them with a rust inhibiter primer and then chassis black paint. Before reassembling the springs, the leafs were greased with a layer of red grease. John and I thought we planned for everything. John started to heat up the metal around the leaf spring bushing to make the bushing come out much easier.

Meanwhile, I was burying my shiny new bushings in the snow to make them shrink in size so that we could press them in easier. Being as forgetful as I am, I wanted to make sure that I could find the bushings, so I put a stick right were I buried them. Returning to get my cold bushings, I dug down into the snow about a foot and a half in diameter and could not find one of the bushings. Finally, I did find the bushing about six feet from were I buried it. The moral of the story is, if you have squirrels that will eat out of your hand and steal the grandkids plastic Easter eggs and eat the candy inside, don't bury your bushing while the squirrels are watching. We had a good laugh.

We found two broken leaf springs and will have to disassemble another spring from one of my parts trucks. I would like to thank Lloyd Duzell for his help. In our situation, he guided us to put a red

TECH CORNER



Improving Gasoline Mileage - It Worked for Me By Ken Bounds

As I was completing restoration of my 1950 Crestliner just before the Grand National Meet in 2008, I realized that my carburetor was a dirty mess. Rather than taking the time to clean and detail it, I remembered that I had a restored carb sitting on the shelf. Switching the carburetor took less than 10 minutes and it looked great. After a test drive, I was good to go.

The drive to Dearborn, though, opened my eyes. My shiny "new" carburetor delivered just under 15 mpg. I remembered that the Crestliner used to get 18 mpg, sometimes better. So, after returning from the meet, I cleaned up the old carburetor and changed it back. Sure enough, on our trip to the Eastern National Meet last year, I averaged 19.6 mpg. Quite an improvement.

This got me to thinking – there must be some creative ways to improve my mileage even further. After all, some new cars get 30, even 40 mpg. My first try was a real shot it the dark, but why not give it a try? I always hear guys talking about using a "hotter" spark plug in their Flatheads – e.g. Champion H-12's instead of the standard H-10's. I thought, what would be the effect of a "colder" plug? After much searching, I found a set of Champion H-8's and made the switch. I had no idea if my theory amounted to anything, but the results were remarkable. On our trip to the Central National Meet in Auburn I carefully recorded mileage and gasoline use – 23.7 mpg!

Now I was on a mission to squeeze more mileage out of that reliable Flathead. I remembered as a kid a neighbor of mine installing a device on his Studebaker that injected water droplets under the carburetor. My neighbor always swore it worked, but my dad was skeptical. It wasn't long before a vintage unit showed up on e-Bay. I picked it up for about \$30. I was afraid of what my fellow V-8ers would think of this scheme, so I never told anyone when I followed the tattered old instruction sheet and installed the water-injection device last September. The device seemed to work and the water was sure going somewhere! Funny thing was my idle speed increased by about 150 rpm and I had to slow it down.

The acid test was our club's Poker Run to Wisconsin last fall – the maiden voyage. Once again, the mileage improvement was unmistakable. The old reliable Crestliner racked up an incredible 29.1 mpg on the 300-plus mile weekend. Just to make sure I hadn't miscalculated anything, I made a run by myself nearly to Iowa and back. My mileage had dropped to about 27.7, but I had unfortunately allowed the water container to run dry.

Since my trusty water-injection system seemed to have the biggest impact on both mileage and the perceived increase in power, I decided to study alternatives to injecting water. In case you have never read about it, the story of how Gatorade was developed in 1965 at the University of Florida is quite interesting. Also interesting is the mineral makeup of Gatorade, available from the Gatorade Sports Science Institute (GSSI) right here in Barrington. It is important to choose the best of the several formulas, and this spring I've added Gatorade "G2" to my water injector. Test drives of the car show that it seems to be running better than ever and I can hardly wait to give it a real mileage test soon. I will report back to you later on the full results, but wanted to at least let you know the story of my quest for better Flathead mileage today, April 1.

- Globally, more than three out of five doctor visits are STRESS RELATED. In the U.S. alone, more than \$22.8 BILLION is spent on anxiety-related health care each year.
- \$\frac{1}{100}\$ 62% of American are stressed about WORK, according to the American Psychological Association. Eating 1.4 ounces of DARK CHOCOLATE EVERY DAY for two weeks was shown to reduce stress.
 - (Granted, the 30-person study was done by researchers at Nestlé.)
- According to a psychological survey done in 1938 and again in 2007, anxiety and mental-health issues are 5 TIMES more common now among high-school and college students than they were toward the end of the GREAT DEPRESSION.




