


APRIL 16 PIZZA MEETING MINUTES

Columbia Overdrive

With Ron Steck's tech talk at this month's meeting being about his Columbia Overdrive, we thought it was a good time to ask "What the heck is a Columbia Overdrive?"

The Columbia "Overdrive" is actually a two-speed rear axle that was available as a dealer-installed option on V-8 Fords beginning in 1934. The unit was manufactured by the Columbia Axle Company of Cleveland, a subsidiary of the Cord Corporation, and was first available on the 1932 Auburn. Although the Columbia was never available as a factory-installed

option on Fords or Mercurys, it was available as original equipment on Lincoln Zephyrs beginning in 1937. Perhaps this is the reason that to this day the Early Ford V-8 Club allows, without point deduction, Columbia axles of the correct year and proper installation on concourse vehicles.

"Driveaways" were a popular practice in the '30s and '40s where buyers of a new car would go to the factory, pick their new car up, and drive it home. Since Columbia axles were not installed in Fords or Mercurys at the factory, Ford and the Columbia Axle Company set up an installation service at Casey's Woodward Hancock Service at 4766 Woodward Avenue in Detroit to install the axles. The cars were then sent back to the Rotunda for delivery.

Columbia Skyway Drive. The demise of the Columbia was foreshadowed in 1941 when Lincoln began offering a Borg-Warner overdrive transmission. For 1949 models, Ford and Mercury changed to the factoryinstalled Borg-Warner and the days of the Columbia were over. What did it do? The second speed in the

Many changes occurred in the axle and the controls over the years. Significant changes occurred after the War when a company

named Truckstell distributed the axles. At this time the option was referred to as the

Columbia rear axle had a ratio of 1.3846:1. resulting in a reduction of engine speed by 27.78%. This means that at 60 mph, the engine is running at a speed equal to 43 mph. Quite a difference! This would be like changing your 4.11:1 rear end to 2.94:1.

The Columbia Today: A properly functioning Columbia is one of the most valuable accessories for an Early V-8 that is driven on today's smooth and more-or-less level roads. The biggest problem is gathering all the parts necessary for a

complete and accurate installation. The sticker price can be a surprise. The list price for a Columbia in 1937 was \$62.40 plus a \$10 installation charge (for the 4-5 hour installation!). Contrast that with the <u>recent price of \$4,850</u> for a completely rebuilt, concourse ready Columbia for a 1940.

Fortunately, there are still folks out there who service, restore, and sell parts for this popular accessory. One of the premier sources for everything Columbia is V-8 Club member and former National Director John Connelly of Temecula, CA. John's website is www.columbiatwospeedparts.com.

The Columbia in Song:

Everyone knows the 1955 song *Hot Rod Lincoln*. But how many of you remember that it was an answer to the earlier *Hot Rod Race* made popular by Arkie Shibley? As you can imagine, it is the story of a race involving a Ford and a Mercury. The Ford's Columbia gets a mention in the song:

We had twin pipes and a Columbia butt, you people may think that I'm in a rut, but to you folks who don't dig the jive, that's two carburetors and an overdrive.

Want more information? An overview of the Columbia Axle is presented in the Early Ford V-8 Club's *V-8 Album*, along with a detailed instruction



manual for installation in 1933-34 Fords. One of the best articles about the Columbia, written by Dave Cole, appears in the May/June 1992 *V-8 Times*. A <u>very</u> comprehensive 4-part series about the company and the hardware, written by Dan Krehbiel and Joe Rosenthal, appeared in the *V-8 Times* from March through October of 1994. Finally, a detailed article about Columbia manuals and documentation, written by Joe Rosenthal, was in the November/December 2001 *V-8 Times*.

I found some facts about barbecuing that I thought you would like and a recipe that I'm going to try this week. Enjoy!!

Some Interesting Facts About Barbecuing

3 out of 4, or 76%, of US households own a barbecue grill.

61% of grill owners own an gas grill; 48% charcoal grill; 9% natural gas grill; 7% outdoor electric grill; 1 in 7 (15%) barbecues with an indoor grill.

The typical grill owner owns 1.4 grills. About half (48%) of all grill owners own a gas grill only; 3 out of 10 (29%) own a charcoal grill only; while nearly 1 out of 5 (18%) owns a both a charcoal and gas grill.

Although men are more likely (66%) than women to be the household member who barbecues, women are more apt to decide when and what foods to be barbecued.



58% of grills are used all year round.

The Fourth of July is by far the most popular holiday for barbecuing, with 3 out of 4 (76%) grill owners barbecuing, followed by Memorial Day (58%) and Labor Day (51%).

Hamburgers, steak, hot dogs, and chicken breast are the most frequently barbecued food items.

London Broil - Serves 8

1 clove garlic, minced

1 teaspoon salt

3 tablespoons soy sauce

1 tablespoon ketchup

1 tablespoon vegetable oil

1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper

1/2 teaspoon dried oregano

4 pounds flank steak

- 1. In a small bowl, mix together garlic, salt, soy sauce, ketchup, vegetable oil, black pepper and oregano
- 2. Score both sides of the meat, diamond cut, about 1/8 inch deep. Rub garlic mixture into both sides of the meat. Wrap tightly in aluminum foil, and refrigerate for 5 to 6 hours, or overnight. Flip meat every few hours.
- 3. Preheat an outdoor grill for high heat, and lightly oil grate.
- 4. Place meat on the prepared grill. Cook for 3 to 7 minutes per side, or to desired doneness.


