Fall Color Tour - Mayslake Peabody Mansion, Oak Brook October 11

We will tour the Mayslake Peabody Mansion and grounds on October 11. We will meet at the Town and Country Mall at the Southeast corner of Palatine and Arlington Heights Road at 9:00 AM and drive to the mansion in Oak Brook. We will arrive in time for a 10:00 AM guided tour of the mansion. **The fee for the tour is \$5.00.** At the end of the guided tour, feel free to walk the grounds and enjoy the art exhibit. The theme of the art exhibit is "When Art and Nature Meet". There are 14 works of art spread around the grounds. You will be given a map before the guided tour.



Francis S. Peabody, whose Peabody Coal Co. became the nation's largest coal producer, purchased over 800 acres from several landowners in DuPage County near Hinsdale. He selected the prominent Chicago architectural firm of Marshall & Fox to design a magnificent 39-room Tudor Revival mansion costing \$750,000. It took two years to build and was completed in 1921. At the time the building was being designed the "Revival Tudor" style of architecture was considered correct for the gentile country house; his mansion is very similar to Compton Wynyates manor house in Warwickshire, England. Mr. Peabody did not have a long time to enjoy his manor, he died in August 1922.

After the tour of the mansion, we will drive to a local restaurant for lunch.

At the end of the tour we presented him a 99-year old postcard featuring the Janesville Coaster Wagon.

Next it was on to the nearby Lincoln-Tallman House where we were able to park several of our cars on the curved driveway in front of the house. This historic house was built by William Tallman from 1855 to 1857. He and his family lived there from 1857 to 1915. When Abraham Lincoln was making a speech in nearby Beloit in October of 1859, Tallman convinced Lincoln to travel to Janesville and spend two nights at his house; this is the only recorded time that Lincoln spent the night in a Wisconsin home. Our group was broken in half and two able tour guides gave us an interesting tour of the house. It is amazing that more than 75% of the furnishings are original to the house, which was technologically advanced for the day.

From here, we drove to O'Riley & Conway's, a nearby Irish restaurant/pub for another delicious


hand award. Winning Culver's gift cards were Joey Novak, overall winner of the car games and Ron Steck, overall winner of the people games.




FROM THE EDITORS

Additionally Scott announced that the Twin Cities Regional Group in Minnesota awarded the NIRG an "above the call of duty" plaque expressing their appreciation for assistance rendered during the weather emergency by our members who were present at the 2015 Central National Meet. They also sent Ken and Carolyn Bounds an award for their work in coming in early and helping prepare the meet.



The membership report was the first thing on the agenda and membership chairman Ken Bounds announced that the membership stands at 86 members. Ken reminded those in attendance that renewals of membership for our regional group will be due in the month of October. Dues will remain \$25.00 for those receiving a paper edition of the Road Chatter newsletter and \$15.00 for those who receive the emailed electronic version. 


