

My First Flathead by Jay Hinshaw

This is the story of my first flathead, the big snowstorm of 1967, and how that snow led to my acquisition, under nefarious circumstances, of a 1950 Ford.

The 23 inch snowstorm of 1967 is, still to this day, the largest snow event in Chicago's weather history. The city was at a stand-still for days. You may recall seeing historic news photos of Lake Shore Drive as a parking lot full of abandoned cars and busses. A few weeks after the storm the city was still clearing snow, and news reports talked about the difficulty the city was having with towing the hundreds of abandoned cars that still remained where they had stalled. Cars were cheap then, the scrap price of a beater was only \$35, and many owners had simply never returned to retrieve cars of little value.

At this time I was a 19 year old kid living at home on the south side of Chicago, a full-time student at the local community college, broke, working Saturdays for gas money. Across the street from the pizza joint where my friends hung out, I noticed what I thought to be one of those abandoned cars in a White Castle parking lot. I checked it out: still half buried in snow was a shoebox Ford, older repaint, rusty rocker panels, and a totally gutted interior with only a wood crate on the floor for a driver to sit on. License plates had been removed, doors unlocked, nothing left behind. An abandoned car for sure, or so I thought at the time.



But this was not just any shoebox Ford. This was a coupe, fairly rare even then. My teenage friends and I were into the usual sixties muscle cars and 57 Chevys, but unlike my friends, I also liked the early Fords, especially the cool-looking coupes. And here was one of those coupes, soon to be towed and probably wind up in a junkyard. What a shame. Some fool had abandoned a coupe. A coupe!

I mentioned my find to my brother-in-law who agreed that it would be a shame, and said he could help me get that car. Bob was in his late twenties, a gear-head with a shady past. He told me he could hot-wire it, and he could get a title so I could get it licensed. (Bob had a side-job wrenching for a fly-by-night used car lot. They had accumulated a desk drawer full of old titles. Back then, junkyards would take cars with or without the title.)

With Bob's encouragement, and with visions of me in that no-cost coupe running through my mind, I went back to the White Castle. I talked to the manager who told me he didn't know who owned the Ford, and if it wasn't removed from his lot soon he was going to have it towed. That's all I needed to hear!

A few days later, on a sunny late-winter afternoon, we went to get that Ford. I put jumper cables on the battery and shoveled snow while Bob hot-wired the coil. It started right up. I was afraid I couldn't drive from the wood crate, so he drove it home. It ran great.

The title Bob got from the car lot drawer was for a 1949; close enough, most cops checking the registration wouldn't know the difference. I spent the next month getting it usable: ignition switch with a key, black vinyl seats from a wrecked Corvair, department store vinyl fabric covering the door cards, brake shoes, touch-up paint over the rust. I never did get a headliner installed; that was (and still is) above my abilities. It was a cobbled together teenager's car, but it looked good to me, and it ran great.

My new Ford was in front of the pizza joint across the street from the White Castle nearly every evening, until one night the real owner appeared with the police. I won't go into all the drama that followed, that would be more of a human interest story than a car story. The owner turned out to be a nice man, refused to press charges in spite of the pressure he got from the police to do so, and sold me the car for \$225, what it was worth before I did all the work on it. So now I owned my car legitimately with a proper title, and for the next couple years I drove that 50 flathead proudly. It was a coupe!

Ford Motor Company Breaks All Records as it Produces its 29 Millionth Automobile, a 1941 Ford Woodie Wagon By John Emmering

The winds of war blustered across the nation in April 1941. Earlier that month Edsel's sons Henry and Benson had taken leave from Ford Motor Company and been commissioned in the U.S. Navy, to be joined by younger brother William in 1943. Company President Edsel Ford had been fighting a long and bitter struggle with the UAW-CIO labor union which would soon end with the signing of the first contract with the union in June. No doubt the rush to complete the Willow Run aircraft plant and begin the production of B-24 Lib-

erator Bombers also weighed heavily on Edsel's mind.

A lighter moment however emerged Tuesday, April 29, 1941 as Edsel's driver whisked him from his executive office to the Rouge assembly plant to celebrate the production of yet another millionth milestone car. Although this car would not be heralded at World's Fairs or tour the country as the 27th and 28th Millionth Fords had done there was still plenty of excitement as the 29 Millionth Ford, a 1941 Super Deluxe Station Wagon rolled down the assembly line. In fewer than 38 years of production Ford Motor Company possessed the world's record for the most vehicles built by the same manufacturer.

Edsel sat in the passenger seat as Miss Barbara Rumney, commander of the Red Cross Motor Corps in Detroit, took the wheel and drove the wagon off of the assembly line. In keeping



with the current temperament of the country which was in war preparation mode the 29 Millionth Ford had been set aside for use by the Detroit Chapter of the American Red Cross Volunteer Motor Corps. The Motor Corps was made up almost exclusively of women who during the war years ended up clocking over 61 million miles responding to nine million calls to transport the sick and wounded, deliver supplies, and take volunteers and nurses to and from their posts.

Edsel posed with the Red Cross Motor Corps women in a short ceremony transferring the car to the Red Cross organization's ownership. Mrs. John Ford, the



executive vice-chairman of the Detroit Chapter of the Red Cross brought greetings from Norman H. Davis, Red Cross National Chairman and his thanks to the Ford Motor Company for donating the Station Wagon to the Red Cross Chapter's use. Mrs. Ford also conveyed Mr. Davis's thanks to Edsel Ford for allowing the Motor Corps to utilize the training facilities of the Highland Park plant where the women were trained by Ford Motor Company personnel in practical auto mechanics and vehicle maintenance.

While other million milestone Fords became museum pieces, this station wagon went into full usage by the Detroit Chapter of the Red Cross. Edsel Ford certainly could have anticipated celebrating many more million milestone commemorations in his career. Sadly the 29 Millionth Ford would be his last as the tremendous pressure he faced in his leadership position at Ford led to physical illness resulting in his death two years later.

Henry Ford II had been serving stateside with the U.S. Navy earning the rank of Lieutenant Senior grade. Just as Henry II was about to enter combat sea duty in the Pacific the government felt he could occupy a more vital role returning to Ford Motor Company to fill his father's shoes and discharged him from active duty in 1943.

In retrospect we can see that as the 29 Millionth Ford rolled off the line in April 1941, the Ford Motor Company and Ford family were entering their "finest hour" protecting our freedom as part of both the military and the arsenal of democracy and showing concern for the humanitarian work of the American Red Cross.

NOVEMBER 16 MEETING MINUTES

Ken further reported that he had received fifty membership renewals for 2017 so far and encouraged members to keep the renewals



membership renewals for 2017 so far and encouraged members to keep the renewals coming in.

NATIONAL CLUB NEWS: The report of National News of the Early Ford V-8 Club of America was given by National President Ken Bounds. Ken reflected on his six years of service on the national board of directors and his three terms as national president. Term limits will cause Ken to sit out 2017 as new leaders assume his former roles. Ken announced that Steve Kroeger had been elected as our new Midwest Director, the position for which our own Jeff Trilling had also been a candidate. Ken announced the other new national officers; President Phill Hall, Vice President Michael Driskell, Secretary Bruce Nelson and David Rehor reappointed as Treasurer. John Caldwell was also elected as Southeast Director.

Ken mentioned the 2017 Eastern National Meet in Chantilly Virginia, June 7 - 11, 2017, sponsored by the Northern Virginia Regional Group # 96. Ken revealed that the registration forms were posted on the national club website. Ken also stated that the one other National Meet for 2017 is the Western National Meet in Salem, Oregon September 11 - 14, 2017, sponsored by the Columbia River Regional Group # 10. Finally Ken informed us that the national board has announced that Dearborn Michigan will be the site of the 2018 Grand National Meet. Members gave Ken a round of applause for his six years of leadership service for the national club.

TREASURER'S REPORT: With Treasurer Joe Serritella out of town Ron Blum delivered the treasurer's report. Ron informed the membership that income in the last month consisted of \$795.00 in membership dues, \$55.00 from advertising and \$36.00 from the 50-50 raffle. Expenses entailed \$45.00 for meeting room, \$79.00 for publishing the Road Chatter and a payment to the insurance company of \$100.00 for Directors and Officers liability coverage.

HEALTH & WELFARE REPORT: Somehow we failed to have Phyllis Madrigali give her report. Phyllis had intended to mention that Gene Heintz is suffering, having difficulty sitting and is experiencing knee problems. Earl has rarely left her side throughout her affliction.

PAST EVENTS:

- John Emmering reported on the November 12th V-8s and Veterans Lunch at Sam's of Arlington, where 24 members and friends gathered. He commented that it was good that Earl Heintz was able to make it and that it was an enjoyable occasion. John mentioned that three Ford V-8s were driven to the event, including Michael Mohawk's 1950 Ford Tudor.
- A few members including John Judge, Frank Madrigali, Len Vinyard and Tom Buscaglia attended the Turkey Dinner sponsored by the Illinois Chapter of the Model A Restorer's Club. The group unanimously agreed that the food was good and that it was an enjoyable event. According to the participants there were about 20 Model "A" Fords out in the lot and a like number of Thunderbirds.



Summary of the November 12 Meeting of the Board of Directors

National Officers for 2017

The Board has elected the following National officers for 2017: President Phill Hall of California, Vice President Michael Driskell of Tennessee, and Secretary Bruce Nelson of Minnesota. David Rehor will continue to serve as Treasurer, that position being appointed by the President. New National Board members are Steve Kroeger of Iowa and John Caldwell of Georgia, replacing Ken Bounds and Wayne Deitrich, respectively, whose terms have ended.

National Meets

Carolyn and I had a wonderful time at the 2016 Western National Meet in Bakersfield, California. The meet was small for a Western meet, but a lot of fun. There were 172 registrations, 291 attendees, and 102 beautiful Early Ford vehicles shown. The hotel, tours, and meals were all excellent.

As I am sure you know, the Northern Virginia Regional Group is hosting the 2017 Eastern National Meet in Chantilly, Virginia, June 7-11. Seventy-five members have already registered; complete forms are available on the National website.

If you would like to visit the beautiful Northwest, you can make plans now to attend the 2017 Western National Meet in Salem, Oregon, hosted by Columbia River RG#10. Over 65 members have already registered. An early registration form is available now on the National website; the full registration package will be available after the first of the year.

The Board has formally selected Dearborn, Michigan, as the site of the 2018 Grand National Meet.

National Meet Awards

The Board has clarified club policy about Dearborn and Rouge awards. Effective immediately, awards are the property of the vehicle owner. If a new owner of a previous Dearborn or Rouge winning vehicle wants to present that vehicle for judging, he or she must start the process over, as though it had not been previously judged.

In addition, the Board took steps to ensure that winners of Dearborn or Rouge plaques receive their personalized name strips more timely.

National Tours

As of now, no National Tours have been calendared for 2017. If your regional group has any interest in hosting a National Tour, you can find guidelines on the national website, or contact your Director for any information you may need.

Judging Standards Committee

The Judging Standards Committee has voted to remove the mandatory 5-point deduction for an added electric fuel pump, providing the installation is properly and neatly done. This change is effective for National Meets in 2017 and beyond.

Membership Survey

Shortly after January 1, a randomly selected number of Early Ford V-8 Club members will receive a survey about the Club. The purpose of the survey is to help the Board understand what the Club can do to better serve it members. If you receive one of these surveys, please answer the questions and return it as soon as you can.

2017 Face-to-Face Board Meeting

Next year's face-to-face meeting will be held February 14-15 in Fort Myers, Florida. This meeting is open to all members. Please let me know if you would like to attend the meeting.

Shortly after our meeting, we learned of the passing Friday of Associate Editor Dave Cole. Dave's Model 18 Notes and countless other articles graced the pages of the V-8 Times since 1970. He will be greatly missed; our condolences go out to his family.

20 Years Ago This Month – December 1996
