truck pictured passing Warren G. Harding Elementary school where Ralph attended, is a good example.



Vintage Ford Police Car Goes Back into Action





Injoying his day off and without a hint of what was to come, Lieutenant Glen Brock of the Hemet California Police Department was driving the department's vintage 1954 Ford patrol car to a special Veteran's Day function at 9:00 am Sunday, November 11, 2018. Suddenly the call to aid a fellow officer came over the air. A patrol officer had attempted a traffic stop on a car in the area of Yale St. and Florida Ave. in Hemet, however the driver bailed out of the car and ran. When the patrol officer gave chase on foot the fleeing suspect fired a handgun at him, thus the emergency call for assistance.

Il available police units proceeded to the scene and the 1954 Ford Squad Car was no exception. After hearing the radio call Lt. Brock activated the rooftop flashing red light and, in a scene reminiscent of the 1950's the vintage Ford patrol car sped Lt. Brock to the scene and into the line of fire. Lt. Brock later commented "I pushed her pretty hard getting to that incident, but she performed well."

The suspect fled into a neighboring apartment complex, and police surrounded the area. Shortly before 11:20 a.m., police officers who were searching for the man who had shot at their colleague were flagged down by a resident at the Whispering Pines Apartments and advised that a man had entered their apartment and fled into a bathroom.

Intering the apartment officers exchanged fire with the offender who had barricaded himself in the bathroom. Soon the police had the building evacuated. SWAT was called out as well a special operations unit. Police negotiators spoke with the offender for an hour and a half without making progress. Finally it appeared that the suspect turned his weapon on himself and committed suicide. A police robot was sent into the bathroom to provide video of the scene.


he lighter side of the incident was the involvement of the 64-year-old 1954 Ford Crestline Police Car which found it's place among the modern Crown Victoria's and SUV's parked outside the crime scene and stuck out as a relic from the past. City of Hemet mechanic Chris Walters wondered why the 1954 Ford Patrol Car didn't make it to the Veteran's Day function, but he was delighted to know that the old Ford performed excellently during it's "Code 3" run and that she is still doing her job well.



Lincoln Motor Car Heritage Museum

An encounter with some of the finest automobiles ever produced

The luxurious Lincoln automobile has been Ford Motor Company's top of the line vehicle since Henry Ford acquired the company and produced the line under his trade mark. I take a special interest in the Lincoln Motor Car Heritage Museum on the grounds of the Gilmore campus in Hickory Corners Michigan since the 1932-1953 Lincolns are recognized by the Early Ford V-8 Club of America. The museum was established and is run by the Lincoln Motor Car Foundation, an organization committed to collecting, preserving and sharing the heritage of the Lincoln automobile. Four Lincoln Automobile Clubs support the Foundation and museum also.

While attending an event on the Gilmore campus this September, I made it a priority to visit the Lincoln Motor Car Heritage Museum to view the great collection of Lincoln cars on display. I also wished to learn about the history of the Lincoln Automobile. Approaching the museum, I noticed the impressive architecture which was inspired by the historic P.J. Platte Lincoln Dealership building in Detroit.

Intering the museum was like stepping into the old automobile dealership except the assortment of vehicles on display ranged from 1922-2017. Immediately catching my eye was a bare chassis from a 1926-

1927 Lincoln displaying the engine and mechanicals. Also, a Lincoln Liberty V-12 aircraft engine was prominently exhibited.

n interesting film presentation gave a short history of the Lincoln Automobile. I learned that the Lincoln Motor Company was started in August 1917 by Henry Leland and his son Wilfred, after Henry Leland left his position at Cadillac. The Lincoln Motor Company first produced Liberty V-12 aircraft engines for the U.S. Department of War and after the end of World War I produced the Model "L", it's first car. Henry Ford purchased the Lincoln Motor Company when Leland's company fell on hard financial times in 1922. At first the Lelands ran the company for Ford, but soon Edsel Ford was placed at the helm.

Ford and his contribution to the Lincoln Automobile. I learned that Edsel improved styling and introduced some new body styles in 1923. He made the line profitable and increased production 45%. It further explained how Edsel began his design partnership with E. T. Gregorie when he hired him as a Lincoln designer in 1931 and how Gregorie's designs would be used on Lincolns and Fords in the 1930'3 and 40's.











variety of early Lincolns were displayed including a 1922 Sport Phaeton, a 1923 Phaeton and a 1927 Imperial Victoria among others. The cars most appreciated by EFV-8 members began with a beautiful blue 1932 Lincoln KB convertible sedan by Dietrich. Further down I spotted several Lincoln-Zephyrs. The collection of Zephyrs included a 1938 Convertible Sedan, a 1940 Town Limousine, 1936 sedan, and a 1937 Coupe.

oving past the attractive Lincoln-Zephyrs I was drawn to the Lincoln Continental display and some great Continentals. A 1940 Continental Cabriolet as well as a 1941 Model were prominently exhibited. My personal favorite car was a 1949 Cosmopoli-

tan Convertible sitting in a corner of the museum. I would love to take that 1949 Cosmopolitan out on a tour. A large display devoted to the Pan American Road Races caught my attention, explaining how the Lincolns dominated those races from 1952-54.

The most historic Lincoln shown was the 1939 "Royal Canadian" Convertible designed for use by King George and Queen Elizabeth, parents of the current monarch, during their visit to Canada and the United States in June 1939. The Lincoln Motor Car Heritage Museum is truly a must-see location for any Ford V-8 enthusiast. I highly recommend the museum and hope our NIRG will be able to plan a trip to Gilmore someday and enjoy the museum as a group.

Henry Ford, Auto THE LAST DAYS OF HENRY FORD

his Early Ford V-8 Club of America that we belong to is centered around the early Ford V-8s that we all enjoy. We have a common experience of driving, repairing, talking about, spending money on, and even sometimes distaining these cars. Our club exists because of these cars and the friendships that we have developed through our interest in them. Some of us also have other automotive hobbies that we like to participate in. Such as; collecting different types of memorabilia, visiting auto museums, watching car movies, etc. One of mine is reading books about all different subjects including auto books about Ford. This article is a review of the book "The Last Days of Henry Ford" by Henry Dominguez.

t first glance one may think that this book has a kind of morbid subject matter. After all, who wants to hear about the death of another person? Well, let me tell you that this book is much more than the story of Henry Ford's last days. The author Henry Dominguez has done extensive research into the things that took place in the year preceding Mr. Ford's demise, and for the three years after his death, to include the passing of Clara Ford.

enry Dominguez begins the story talking about ■ the heavy rains and flooding that had been taking place the week of Mr. Ford's death. The waters had begun to inundate the residence of the Fords. Even the powerhouse for the estate could no longer generate electricity because of the floodwaters. As we are taking all this in, we are brought back in time for a little summary of the history of the Ford empire. Mr. Ford had taken the concept of "a car for every man" from a small shop, into the vast River Rouge Plant that made him \$2500 every hour it was operating!

/ e are informed about the people that are part of his life, from servants, drivers, and close friends, to gardeners and security guards. The author helps us to understand a little bit about Mr. Ford through the ones that were involved in the Ford's daily affairs. Some of the experiences that we learn about are; the many law suits, Edsel Ford's untimely death, and Henry's mistress. All of these experiences are weaved into the story of the very bad weather that the

Dearborn area was having during these last days. It's as if one can feel the darkness and flooding that is beginning to surround Henry Ford.

The author has interviewed people that were there on the day of Mr. Ford's death, April 7, 1947. They give us very personal thoughts and feelings that they had on that fateful night. Some of these folks have passed on, so their testimonies are invaluable to get the sense of the grief that they all felt during this time. The powerhouse was no longer producing, the floodwaters had come, and Henry Ford was dead.

he time had now come for the funeral. There was much planning to do for the Ford family who now had to determine how much of this private man was going to be made public. There were thousands that wanted to pay their last respects to this man. The author took us into the thinking of some of the vast crowds that came to see Mr. Ford. For some it was to see this man who started a revolution, some to be a part of history, and others just to see a man who had done much good for the common person.

he last section of this book deals with the end of Clara Ford's life, and takes us to the decisions that she had to make concerning the family business. The enormity of the task was overwhelming but she handled it as best as she could. She made sure the wills were up to date and would be followed just as she and Henry had wanted. Clara passed in 1950.

enry Dominguez has written a book that gives a Livery personal look into Mr. Ford's last days. There is an abundance of documentation that would allow more research if you were so inclined. The book has a "flow" about it that is easy to follow. The reader will almost feel as if they were right there in the Ford family seeing this all take place. It was one book that I had a hard time putting down. If you are a fellow V-8er that enjoys reading, and is interested in learning about the man that started the Ford Motor Company, then I would highly recommend this book.

*Just a note: Henry Dominguez has written an article about the making of this book that is published in the Jan/Feb 2015 V8 Times. Also worthwhile reading.




