

It was a double whammy in 1951 when Ford Motor Company stunned the industry with the introduction of both the Fordomatic transmission, and their new "hardtop" model, the Ford Victoria.

eneral Motors Chevrolet Division had one upped Ford in 1949 when they unveiled their Styleline Deluxe Belaire, a pillarless model that became popular with the public. Chevrolet beat Ford to the punch once again in 1950 with the introduction of the "Power Glide" transmission which was the first automatic transmission in a low priced car. Ford had played catch up however and brought in their own "Fordomatic" automatic transmission supplied by Borg-Warner for the 1951 model year and also unveiled the Victoria model January 28, 1951.

The Ford Crestliner temporarily filled the gap the absence of a hardtop created when Ford engineers discovered that the 1949-50 Tudors and coupes structurally required their pillars. There was no need to fear though as the company had acquired the services of accomplished automobile designer Gordon Buehrig in 1949 and gave him the project.

Buehrig gained recognition during his time with the Auburn Automobile Company for his unique design for the Cord Automobile among other design achievements. Buehrig solved the dilemma of developing a hardtop model by using a convertible body with a permanent metal roof welded in. The car was dubbed the Victoria, reviving a model name used on a line Ford cars from 1931 to 1934.









ithout a doubt the new Victoria models were an immediate hit with automobile customers. The "all purpose touring car" as some dubbed it had much to offer with it's standard V-8 engine, excellent styling and choice of manual three speed transmission, optional overdrive, or "Fordomatic Drive" transmission. Priced at \$2,060, which was just \$146 more than the

six-cylinder Chevrolet Belaire, the Victoria took over age. The young man was tragically killed in action the market beating out Belaire sales. Ford turned out 110,286 Victoria cars and sidelined its Crestliner model, turning out only 8,703 1951 units.

to have a great example of Ford Motor Company's innovative Victoria in our midst with the beautifully restored 1951 Ford Victoria owned by our longtime member John Judge. In attractive Hawaiian Bronze with a Sandpiper Tan roof, John's car is equipped with Fordomatic Drive, revealed by the emblem on the trunk. The car is decked out with dual accessory spotlights and back up lights also.

t was over thirty years ago, back in the 1980's that ■ John came to purchase the Victoria. A newspaper ad offering a "1951 Ford Victoria with automatic transmission" for sale caught his eye. As he had been looking for a Victoria equipped with Fordomatic Drive he followed up. Impressed by the very original low mileage Victoria John made the purchase.

here is an interesting story behind the Victoria that John learned from the seller. It seems the Victoria was purchased new by a young man in 1951 who lived with his mother in Oswego, Illinois. The car was apparently his pride and joy. When the young man was drafted into the Army for service in the Korean Conflict, he stored the Victoria in his mother's gar-

in Korea and his mother did not have the heart to sell the car. She kept it for many years undisturbed in her garage, finally selling it to her neighbor. The neighbor offered the car for sale a while later and the ur Northern Illinois Regional Group is fortunate car was purchased by a car enthusiast in the Chicago area. As the story goes the new owner's wife felt he had too many collector cars and demanded that he sell the Victoria. John purchased the car from the advertisement this gentleman placed.

> Then John took his Victoria to a body shop in Chicago for painting, it was discovered that in the years the car sat in the damp garage rust had developed from the inside out. The sheet metal on the bottoms of the doors and the floor had to be replaced. When the work was completed John was pleased with the results. With John facing health challenges, the Victoria had been in storage for five years. However its now back in service with a new carburetor and fuel pump. We are all glad to see John back on the road on activities with his great Victoria.

The maroon 1946 Ford Coupe cruised slowing through the streets of Hollywood on Saturday evening March 9, 1963 as the occupants scanned the storefronts looking for a vulnerable location to ply their trade of armed robbery. Ex-convict Gregory Powell, 30 was behind the wheel of the Ford with recent parolee Jimmy Lee Smith, 32, known as "Jimmy Youngblood", his passenger. Smith, who was recently released from Folsom Prison, served most of his adult life in various correctional institutions for numerous thefts. However, he had never pulled an armed robbery or carried a gun until he paired with Greg Powell. Barely two weeks earlier Jimmy Smith, fresh from Folsom, had met Powell, who befriended

## Traffic Stop of a 1946 Ford Coupe by Los Angeles Police Officers ends in Cop Killing in a Bakersfield Onion Field

him, staking him with cash and suggesting they do some "jobs" together. With no other prospects Smith agreed and found himself involved with four robberies with Powell during their nine-day long partnership.

n a trip the criminals made to Boulder City Nevada, Powell had purchased a gun for Smith and bought the 1946 Ford from an individual for \$125.00. On Saturday March 9, 1963, the pair, along with Powell's girlfriend Maxine returned to California where they

first had met and rented a motel room in Bakersfield. Leaving Maxine behind that evening the robbers headed out in the Ford Coupe for Los Angles to pull a few more robberies to enhance their finances. Arriving in the Hollywood section of the city where our story began, as Jimmy rode in the Ford the thought rushed through his mind that this would be his last robbery. He planned to steal the Ford Coupe from Powell when he had a chance and ditch his partner, who he correctly believed was too violent and mentally unstable.





wo other partners were also cruising the dark streets of Hollywood that evening, these in a plain looking unmarked 1963 Plymouth sedan. They were Officer Ian Campbell, 31 and Officer Carl Hettinger, 28, both members of the Los Angeles Police Department. The partners coincidentally also had only been paired for nine days, assigned to a plain clothes "Felony Car" scouting for serious crimes. Campbell, of Scottish descent was an avid bagpiper. He had once prepared to be a physician, however left his pre-med program, and married his wife

Adah a former showgirl. The couple had two young daughters.

Hettinger, recently married, had studied agriculture but left college also to join the LAPD a few years earlier.

oth officers took notice of the maroon 1946 Ford Coupe as it headed down Carlos Avenue toward Gower Street in Hollywood. The two occupants of the 16 year old Ford which bore Nevada plates, looked like movie hoodlums in their leather jackets and caps, not like your average tourists. With a burned out license plate light as reason for the stop the officers pulled the Ford V-8 to the curb. When the officers confronted the pair, Powell quickly stepped from the Ford placing his revolver in Campbell's back. Campbell pled with his partner Carl Hettinger to obey Powell's order to give his gun to Jimmy Smith which he reluctantly did.

orcing Officer Campbell to drive the '46 Ford, Powell sat up front with Smith covering Officer Hettinger in the back seat of the coupe. Powell directed Campbell to drive to the outskirts of Bakersfield, where he was told to head down a dirt road through an onion field where the officers were ordered out of the car. Mistakenly believing that he had already committed a capitol offense, Powell shot Campbell in the face, killing him. Hettinger broke away and ran evading Powell as he pursued him. Smith likely shot four rounds into Campbell's chest and then took off in the Ford leaving Powell, who then stole a 1957 Plymouth from a nearby trailer court. Powell however was quickly spotted and arrested by the California Highway Patrol in the stolen car. Powell gave up Smith as his accomplice and he was arrested.

onvicted of murder, both Powell and Smith originally were sentenced to death, however court decisions vacated their death penalties. Officer Hettinger, not injured by bullets, felt guilt for giving up his gun, suffered emotional illness leading to kleptomania and his termination from the LAPD. Joseph Waumbaugh immortalized the story in his book and movie "The Onion Field", influencing the parole board to deny Powell's parole. Jimmy Lee Smith was paroled in 1982 despite public outrage, but was constantly in and out of prison until his death in 2007, at age 76. Powell continued to pay for his crime until his 2012 death at 79 while imprisoned.


