

TECH CORNER



Columbia Overdrive

The Columbia Overdrive is still a sought-after accessory to this day for 1930s - 1940s Early V-8s. It is hard to believe that it is now <u>75 years</u> since this popular item was installed in new Fords and Mercurys. We thought it was a good time to ask "What the heck is a Columbia Overdrive?"

The Columbia "Overdrive" is actually a two-speed rear axle that was available as a dealer-installed option on V-8 Fords beginning in 1934. The unit was manufactured by the Columbia Axle Company of Cleveland, a subsidiary of the Cord Corporation, and was first available on the 1932 Auburn. Although the Columbia was never available as a factory-installed option on Fords or Mercurys, it was




available as original equipment on Lincoln Zephyrs beginning in 1937. Perhaps this is the reason that to this day the Early Ford V-8 Club allows, without point deduction, Columbia axles of the correct year and proper installation on concourse vehicles.

"Driveaways" were a popular practice in the '30s and '40s where buyers of a new car would go to the factory, pick their new car up, and drive it home. Since Columbia axles were not installed in Fords or Mercurys at the factory, Ford and the Columbia Axle Company set up an installation

service at Casey's Woodward Hancock Service at 4766 Woodward Avenue in Detroit to install the axles. The cars were then sent back to the Rotunda for delivery.

Many changes occurred in the axle and the controls over the years. Significant changes occurred after the War when a company named Truckstell distributed the axles. At this time the option was referred to as the Columbia Skyway Drive. The demise of the Columbia was foreshadowed in 1941 when Lincoln began offering a Borg-Warner overdrive transmission. For 1949 models, Ford and Mercury changed to the factoryinstalled Borg-Warner and the days of the Columbia were over.

What did it do? The second speed in the Columbia rear axle had a ratio of 1.3846:1, resulting in a reduction of engine speed by 27.78%. This means that at 60 mph, the engine is running at a speed equal to 43 mph. Quite a difference! This would be like changing your 4.11:1 rear end to 2.94:1.



TECH CORNER



The Columbia Today: A properly functioning Columbia is one of the most valuable accessories for an Early V-8 that is driven on today's smooth and more-orless level roads. The biggest problem is gathering all the parts necessary for a complete and accurate installation. The sticker price can be a surprise. The list price for a Columbia in 1937 was \$62.40 plus a \$10 installation charge (for the 4-5 hour installation!). Contrast that with the price of \$4,850 for a completely rebuilt, concourse ready Columbia for a 1940 about 10 years ago.

Fortunately, there are still folks out there who service, restore, and sell parts for this popular accessory. One of

The Columbia in Song:

Everyone knows the 1955 song *Hot Rod Lincoln*. But how many of you remember that it was an answer to the earlier *Hot Rod Race* made popular by Arkie Shibley? As you can imagine, it is

the story of a race involving a Ford and a Mercury. The Ford's Columbia gets a mention in the song:

We had twin pipes and a Columbia butt, you people may think that I'm in a rut, but to you folks who don't dig the jive, that's two carburetors and an overdrive.

Columbia Axle is presented in the Early Ford V-8 Club's *V-8 Album*, along with a detailed instruction manual for installation in 1933-34 Fords. One of the best articles about the Columbia, written by Dave Cole, appears in the May/June 1992 *V-8 Times*. A very comprehensive 4-part series about the company and the hardware, written by the late Dan Krehbiel and Joe Rosenthal, appeared in the *V-8 Times* from March through October of 1994. Finally, a detailed article about Columbia manuals and documentation, written by Joe Rosenthal, was in the November/December 2001 *V-8 Times*.

EGGNOG Cookies

| 2 1/2 cups all purpose flour | 3/4 cup butter; salted; softened | |
|------------------------------|--|--|
| 1 teaspoon baking powder | 1/2 cup eggnog | |
| 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon | 1 teaspoon vanilla extract | |
| 1/2 teaspoon ground nutmeg | 2 large egg yolks | |
| 1 1/4 cup sugar | 1 tablespoon ground nutmeg, for sprinkling | |

Preheat oven to 300F. In a medium bowl combine flour, baking powder, cinnamon and nutmeg. Mix well with a wire whisk and set aside. In a large bowl cream sugar and butter with an electric mixer to form a grainy paste. Add eggnog, vanilla and egg yolks and beat at medium speed until smooth. Add the flour mixture and beat at low speed just until combined. Do not overmix. Drop by rounded teaspoons onto ungreased baking sheets, 1 inch apart. Sprinkle lightly with nutmeg. Bake for 23-25 minutes or until bottoms turn light brown. Transfer to cool, flat surface immediately with spatula.
