
us. It will be a great time!

After lunch the only real task we had to do was clean up the area and stack the rented tables and chairs. This gave us plenty of time for more visiting and to observe some horses being trained.





The Story of Yockeytown "Streets of Yesterday" Museum By Gary Osborne

Over the years many of our members have had the opportunity to visit the Yockeytown Museum owned by members Randy and Debbie Yockey. This year they made the difficult decision to temporarily close the museum. In lieu of visiting the museum, I thought it would be interesting to find out about its history. I contacted Randy, and here is a synopsis of what he wrote.

It really began when Randy was about 14 years old when he got a job at the local Ford Dealership. He started collecting some of the items that were being thrown out. Even at that age he was beginning to see the value of preserving history. As he continued in his career, he also met and married Debbie, who began collecting right alongside of him. They eventually bought property in St. Charles and built a couple of small buildings to house his John Deere collection. You see, Randy is also a very avid John Deere tractor enthusiast. When they had completed that project, they decided to build a replica Ford dealership. It was dedicated to Randy's father -in-law, who had started a used car dealership in Cascade, Iowa.

In 2004 there was a large fire at Friendly Ford where Randy was now a junior partner. Much of the showroom windows and parts of the building were repurposed at the museum. It was all shaping up to look like a real dealership. Once that portion was completed, they knew that they needed to add some displays that would complement the history they were looking to highlight. I will only write about two of the main displays here.



First, there was a desire to construct an exact replica of the Sinclair Gas Station that Randy's Grandfather had owned and operated in Sioux City, Iowa. A lot of searching went into locating the tooling, equipment, and period correct items to go into the station. Even the bricks that were

used for its construction were from Sioux City Iowa Brick Company, which would have been the exact bricks his Grandfather would have used.

Second, when one walks into the museum, the first thing to notice is the large old classic bar. It is what Randy calls the Hamm's Beer Saloon. The bar is actually a recreation of a Chicago style bar from the 1940s. Believe it or not, it really began its life as a display cabinet they found at a flea market in Wisconsin. It looks pretty amazing!

There is so much more to see in the museum that it kind of takes your breath away. There is a diner, barber shop, post office, movie theater, library, the Sinclair Station, the bar, lots of automotive memorabilia, and dozens of neon signs. Of course, there are several tractors and Ford vehicles. A 1940 Ford, 1957 Ranchero, Model T, Mustang Mach 1, Grand Torino Sport, and a couple of pickups.

The Yockeys have done a wonderful job of preserving a little bit of history for us all to enjoy. If they do ever decide to reestablish a new and improved museum to help us walk back in time, let's hope we will get to enjoy that little walk through history with them. And for those who were privileged to see this museum I hope the photos will bring back fond memories.


